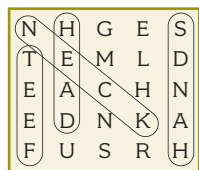

- Besides being a healthy place to play, it gave Mary something wonderful and special of her own to share with other people.

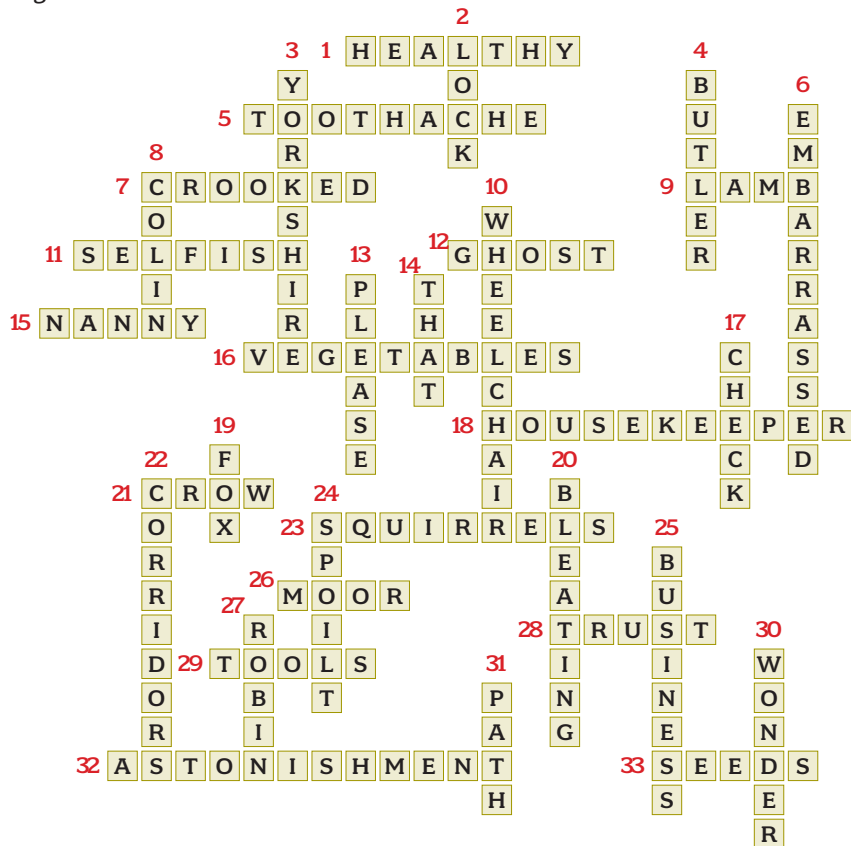

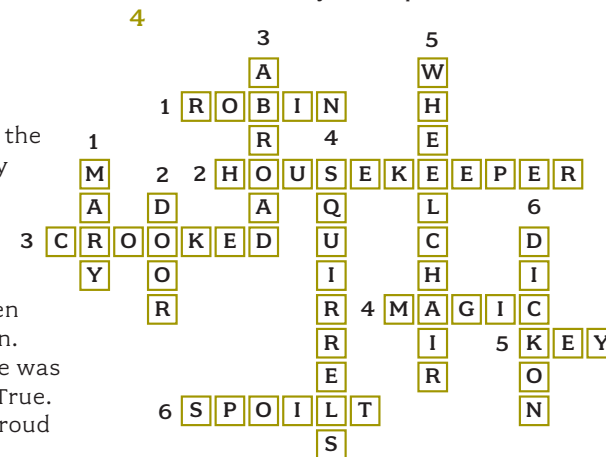
